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INTRODUCTION

How the Synar report helps the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention

In accordance with the tobacco regulations, States are required to provide detailed information on progress made in enforcing youth tobacco access laws (FFY 2012 Compliance Progress) and future plans to ensure compliance with the Synar requirements to reduce youth tobacco access rates (FFY 2013 Intended Use Plan). These data are required by 42 U.S.C. 300x-26 and will be used by the Secretary to evaluate State compliance with the statute. Part of the mission of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) is to assist States¹ by supporting Synar activities and providing technical assistance helpful in determining the type of enforcement measures and control strategies that are most effective. This information is helpful to CSAP in improving technical assistance resources and expertise on enforcement efforts and tobacco control program support activities, including State Synar Program support services, through an enhanced technical assistance program involving conferences and workshops, development of training materials and guidance documents, and onsite technical assistance consultation.

How the Synar report can help States

The information gathered for the Synar report can help States describe and analyze substate needs for program enhancements. These data can also be used to report to the State legislature and other State and local organizations on progress made to date in enforcing youth tobacco access laws when aggregated statistical data from State Synar reports can demonstrate to the Secretary the national progress in reducing youth tobacco access problems. This information will also provide Congress with a better understanding of State progress in implementing Synar, including State difficulties and successes in enforcing retailer compliance with youth tobacco access laws.

¹The term "State" is used to refer to all the States and territories required to comply with Synar as part of the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant Program requirements (42 U.S.C. 300x-64 and 45 C.F.R. 96.121).

The Annual Synar Report (ASR) must be received by SAMHSA no later than December 31, 2012. The ASR must be submitted in the **approved OMB report format**. Use of the approved format will avoid delays in the review and approval process. The chief executive officer (or an authorized designee) of the applicant organization must sign page 1 of the ASR certifying that the State has complied with all reporting requirements.

The State must upload one copy of the ASR using the online WebBGAS (Block Grant Application System). In addition, the following items must be uploaded to WebBGAS:

- FFY 2013 Synar Survey Results: States that use the Synar Survey Estimation System (SSES) must upload one copy of SSES Tables 1–5 (in Excel) to WebBGAS. States that do not use SSES must upload one copy of ASR Forms 1, 4, and 5, and Forms 2 and 3, if applicable, (in Excel) to WebBGAS.

Briefly describe all checked activities:

Merchant Education and/or training:

DMHSA and DRT jointly coordinate and conduct merchant and community education. Both agencies are responsible for conducting random, announced Synar inspections. During compliance inspections, retailers are provided with merchant education packets and other merchant support materials such as the door sticker and register sticker sign showing "P.L. 24-278 No Sale under 18". Also, FDA's "Break the Chain of Tobacco Addiction" retailer education campaign materials were distributed.

Annually, DMHSA produces and distributes merchant educational and awareness materials in a packet to approximately 300+ licensed tobacco vendors that 1) includes information on Guam youth access laws and federal law regarding sale of tobacco to youth; 2) provides specific strategies for how they can comply with the Guam youth access laws; and 3) highlights the health effects of tobacco use.

Incentives for merchants who are in compliance:

After each individual Synar inspection where "No" sale occurred, immediately the Enforcement Officer team member will issue a "Certificate of Compliance" signed by both the Directors of the Department of Taxation and the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse. However, if a sale is made, they are immediately issued a violation ticket/citation and referred to the Department of Revenue and Taxation for payment and/or enforcement action.

Community education regarding youth access laws:

a) The 22nd Annual Youth for Youth conference brought together 60 youth leaders and over 400 youth islandwide. The conference is designed to prevent substance abuse, including tobacco among middle and high school students.

b) DMHSA continue to support 1) tobacco control policy efforts to reduce youth access and increase cessation services to at-risk populations in the community; and 2) education, information dissemination and environmental activities use to prevent tobacco sales to minors.

d) Continue to provide training and technical assistance to public and private businesses in their efforts to assess and create a drug-free and tobacco-free workplace environments.

e) Continue to conduct annual compliance checks required by Synar.

Community mobilization to increase support for retailer compliance with youth access laws:

DMHSA is a member of the Non-Communicable Disease Consortium and was represented in the Tobacco Prevention Action Group. The NCD Consortium was formed in 2010 to specifically address the escalating chronic diseases on Guam. The group is made up of members from the government, business, private and non-profit organizations, dedicating their time and efforts in implementing projects and activities addressing the risk factors such as: Smoking, Nutrition, Alcohol, Physical Activity and Obesity (SNAPO). Funding was received from the Secretariat of the Pacific Community (SPC) to develop the first Guam Non-Communicable Disease Strategic Plan. Funding was also received from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to develop and enhance NCD infrastructure through effective collaborative processes.

Policy Approaches:

On May 2, 2012, a memorandum from the Governor of Guam was circulated to all Government of Guam Agency regarding the Enforcement of Tobacco Control Laws. In trying to address tobacco use and its impact on the health of Guam's residents, the following policy and public laws were established:

- Executive Order 2007-18: Mandates all Government of Guam workplaces to be tobacco-free.
- Public Law 28-80: Natasha Protection Act: Prohibits smoking on public places.
- Public Law 30-63: No smoking within 20 feet of any public entrance or exit.
- Public Law 31-102: Prohibits smoking in any motor vehicle where minors are present.

In consequences to violating these statutes result in a fine that could cost up \$500 per individual and \$3,000 per business.

Guam conducts annual inspections and citations are issued to clerks and/or store owners each time a sale occurs. The issuance of citations of sales at time of inspection is the standard operating procedures by the Department of Revenue and Taxation.

Guam has just received the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) contract for FDA State Tobacco Compliance Check Inspection Program which became effective October 1, 2012. Guam anticipates the hiring of the FDA Program Coordinator sometime in the second quarter of the fiscal year FY2013. Hiring of the back-up FDA Program Coordinator to follow pending Government of Guam personnel evaluation and recruitment process.

DMHSA will continue to work collaboratively with the Guam Department of Revenue and Taxation to continue the efforts of the Tobacco (Synar) Compliance and Enforcement Team.

Law Enforcement Efforts:

Guam will continue to seek opportunities to improve methods to carry-out Synar inspections; the inspection procedures; regulations or policies; and/or vendor education activities. The Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) is the mandated only one agency that conducts all enforcements and Synar inspections. They have developed strong processes for ensuring consistency in the inspections and safety for participating youth. DRT also conducts additional enforcement inspections year-round for sales to minors, point-of-purchase signage, and tobacco displays throughout the remainder of the years. Continues inspections are a reminder to tobacco retailers that enforcement of the youth tobacco access law is occurring.

Retailer Education:

Guam continue to conduct merchant education through a variety of avenues: DRT provides a merchant education packet with each tobacco retailer license - both new and renewals. Also, DRT and DMHSA leave merchant education materials with retailers following a Synar compliance check. Merchant Education is also conducted during Synar compliance checks enforcing the other parts of the Guam P.L. 24-278 (i.e., point-of-sale signage, tobacco displays).

Support of Enforcement and Youth Tobacco Access Laws:

Guam will continue its partnership with the DRT for the enforcement of youth tobacco access laws as mandated. The inspection teams will continue to be trained in inspections procedures prior to their participation and the actual conduct of inspections.

Limitations on completeness/accuracy of list of tobacco outlets:

DRT tobacco retail license requires cleaning of eneligible outlets after the DMHSA receives it. DRT's data base systems to update Business Licenses information needs improvement. Propose Plan: DMHSA will be working with DRT on updating an accurate DRT official list of licensed tobacco vendors with updated information associated with the listed retail outlet, including name of retail outlet, physical address and village, and business phone number.

Difficulty recruiting youth inspectors:

Recruiting youth inspectors from both genders specifically for 17 year old male is an issue this reporting period. Also, the configuration of teams where two adult males (Inspector and and Driver) will use only all male youth inspector. In some cases two females or two males in one inspection, instead of using one female and one male at each inspection. Another issue was making sure that each youth received the proper training to complete inspections, especially when first time youth are used. Guam's Manual of Procedures includes a section on "Legal Considerations" which address issues related to confidentiality, protection of minors' identities, immunity for youth inspectors, and non-involvement of youth inspectors of legal proceedings arising from the inspection process.

Guam's Manual of Procedures emphasizes the importance of ensuring the safety of youth inspectors throughout the inspection process. Specifically, youth inspectors are instructed to never venture into any establishment where they may feel unsafe, and to retreat immediately if upon entry into a store, they have a reason to feel uncomfortable or unsafe. In addition, Guam's Manual of Procedures make it mandatory for adult inspectors to always be within the vicinity of a youth inspector during an attempted buy.

Guam P.L. 24-278 Section 6120 outlines all of the legal requirements relating to the conduct of inspections, including the enlistment of youth inspectors from ages 12-17, the necessity for parental consent in writing, the right to use video recording

equipment during inspections, the necessity to avoid entrapment by mandating all youth inspectors to answer truthfully when asked about their age, the need for adult supervision of all youth inspectors, and the role of the adult inspector in informing the vendor of non-compliance with the law only after the youth inspector has left the premises.

Guam's Manual of Procedures outlines in detail the requirements for inspection, consistent with the law and with recommended CSAP protocols. One item of note is that the Manual of Procedures prescribes the recruitment of youth inspectors' aged 14-17, consistent with Federal guidelines, although Guam's law allows for youth as young as 12 to participate.

There are a total of 19 villages in Guam. Based on the more recent tobacco vendor inspections (September 2010), the census realized 312 tobacco outlets throughout the island that were accessible to minors. Out of the 312 sample size outlets, 303 were found eligible, and 284 were inspected.

According to SAMHSA recommendations, Guam was expected to sample anywhere from 130 to 200 outlets. Because of the size of the sample frame and the number of tobacco outlets located in each village, it was decided that actual island-wide canvassing of all tobacco outlets was necessary.

The coverage rate was determined by taking the total number of matched outlets on the frame divided by the total number of outlets found by the coverage study and multiplying this number by 100.
